OLD TOWN — Harry I. Goldsmith, 92, died at an area nursing home, Jan. 23, 1982. He was born in Russia, July 15, 1889, the son of David and Stella Goldsmith. He came to the United States in 1902 at the age of 13. In 1917 he founded Goldsmith Furniture Co., in Old Town, with his father, and remained president of the firm until his death. He was a member of Temple Israel, Old Town; the Jewish Community Center and the B'nai B'rith, both of Bangor; the Zionist Organization of American; Jewish Home for the Aged, Portland; also a member of the National Retail Furniture Association and the New England Home Furnishings Association. Mr. Goldsmith was a very well respected and prominent businessman. Surviving are his wife, Alice (Miller) Goldsmith of Old Town; a son, Joseph E. Goldsmith of Bangor; a daughter Mrs. Natalie Gewertz of South Pasadena, Calif.; a sister, Mrs. Sara Mendel of New York; four granddaughters, Donna E. Goldsmith of North Miami, Fla., Susan R.
