



KENNETH D. GROSSMAN

Kenneth D. Grossman, 18, of 74 Congress Street, died Saturday night as the result of an automobile accident in Trenton.

He was born in Boston, September 23, 1947, the son of Phillip L. and Jeanette (Cohen) Grossman. A graduate of Bangor High School, he was active in school athletics and extra-curricular organizations. He was enrolled as a member of the fall freshman class at Boston University.

Surviving are his paternal grandparents: his father and mother of Bangor; a sister, Mrs. Priscilla Williams of White Plains, N. Y.; several cousins, aunts and uncles.

Funeral services were held Sunday at 5 p. m. at the Jewish Community Chapel, Centre Street, Bangor. Interment was in Beth Israel Cemetery.

Car Fatality

An 18 year old Bangor youth was killed Saturday evening when the sedan in which he was a passenger failed to negotiate a curve on the Bayside Road at Trenton and turned over several times, state police said.

Trooper William F. Robinson of Ellsworth identified the youth as Kenneth D. Grossman and added that he was thrown from the vehicle.

The driver of the 1965 sedan, Stephen R. Ollove, 18, and another passenger, Barry J. Goldsmith, 18, both of Bangor, sustained minor injuries in the accident, Trooper Robinson said.

Ollove was taken to the Maine Coast Memorial Hospital in Ellsworth, treated for a bruised leg and released. Goldsmith complained of a bruised shoulder but did not receive treatment. A third passenger, Philip L. Salzman, 16, of Bangor, was not injured.

Trooper Robinson said that the accident occurred about 300 yards south of the Ellsworth-Trenton line on the Bayside Road at 7:32 p.m.

All passengers were seated on the back seat of the sedan, Robinson said. After rolling over several times the vehicle came to rest on its left side on the highway.

The two-door sedan was demolished, Robinson said, and the accident is still under investigation.

Assisting Trooper Robinson at the scene were Dr. James H. Crowe of Ellsworth, county medical examiner, Officer George Openshaw of the Ellsworth Police Department, State Police Sgt. Bennett Dunbar, Troopers Theodore Grindie and Ronald Libby, Officer Charles Marshall of the Ellsworth police and George Mahan of Ellsworth.

Grossman Memorial Fund Started

A memorial fund is being established by the friends and relatives of Kenneth D. Grossman, 18-year-old Bangor youth, who was killed last Saturday when the car in which he was a passenger failed to negotiate a curve on the Bayside Road in Trenton and turned over several times.
